## South Norfolk Baptists Arrange Shipment for Overseas Needy

Needy South Korean will become the recipients of a slightly delayed Christmas present in the form of 723 pounds of used clothing collected by the South Norfolk Baptist Church.

Last February the Woman's Missionary Union and the Training Union of the church collected the clothing in South Norfolk, after hearing a chaplain just back from Korea speak at the church on the plight of the half-freezing nation.

The chaplain told the congregation that even old rags that the average American would deem of no value, were worthwhile to send to the Koreans.

The bale of clothing was accordingly gathered, but was not shipped until the \$70 required could be appropriated to pay the freight to the port of Pusan.

Recently the church appropriated the money to pay the shipping costs and shortly after Christmas the ship Pioneer Cove will deliver the bale to the port of Pusan, where the Rev. Rex Ray, Southern Baptist missionary, will receive and distribute the clothing to men, women and children among South Korea's needy.
