"For of all sad words of tongue or pen, The saddest are these, 'It might have been.' "


LIGHT UP THE CHURCH HOUSE



Coca Cola is now celebrating its seventy-fifth year of history in Norfolk, Virginia. A. F. Cathey sold only 605 gallons of his new product in 1901. Things have gone better with Coke ever since. Wooden horse drawn wagons rattled along the streets to deliver the refreshment.

The secret formula was born on May 8, 1886 one sunny morning in the backyard of Dr. John S. Pemberton, Atlanta, Georgia. He heated the contents in a three—legged cast iron kettle and stirred the reddish brown syrup with a wooden spoon. The first experiment was to mix some syrup with plain water and ice. The second try he used carbonated water and the drink was a hit.

The company gave awards in the early days. A special diamond studded watch fob was the reward for bottling 100,000 gallons. Alonzo F. Cathey and his Norfolk Coca Cola Bottling Works had bottled 98,000 gallons a previous year.

A friend asked him why he had not ordered the extra 2,000 gallons, a mere week's supply, which would have qualified him for the diamond watch fob.

"If I had done that", Cathey replied, "those diamonds would never have sparkled for me".

There is a commandment in Exodus 20:16 that Mr. Cathey no doubt lived by, "Thou shalt not bear false witness". A man's integrity and honesty are of tremendous value and is not worth a 2.000 gallon lie. It is the pause that refreshes to find a business man of honesty.

A person is never all that he ought to be until he loves God. The commandment "Thou shalt love God", must be obeyed, or all is vain.

Some of us struggle with this commandment making a few claims. Some put love for self in his heart and not others. Immanuel Kant speaking of this problem said, "How can you make yourself love someone you don't love." You can be ordered to go to the grocery for a pound of meat, and that you can carry out. You can be told to stay away from the tavern, and you can do that. But how can one begin to obey the command to love?

Can you force a person to love someone? Here is someone wealthy and another who is poor. Is that the way we decide love? Here is a father who asks, "Why of all people! Are you in love with such and such a girl?" And the boy simply answers, "She is the only girl in the world for me". Physical love is like that.

Christ would not issue a command which could not be obeyed. The love he demands is different from physical love. We are able to obey Christ's command.

There are many short-cut seekers in the world today. A man says "I give my heart to God . . . now I'm perfect." Wesley insisted that loving God was not as easy as that. For example, you decide shall I go to the seashore today or attend church? Does God care? Shall I put my love of recreation before my love of God?

The same issue developes when a husband no longer loves his wife but is moved towards his neighbor's wife. The seventh commandment confronts him and he has to choose between the love of God and lust of the flesh.

Every person should make loving God the true goal. Your heart will follow your will, you will practice and imitate the life of Christ. Grow in the love of God by seeking it in day by day decisions. To love like that will be Heavenly.

Carry your corner! The conditions of the church and the prosperity of the church are suggested in these three words.

You recall the story. The report that our Lord is in Capernaum has filled the house and packed the space outside with an eager congregation. While he is preaching, a strange funeral looking procession is seen approaching. It is a pallet, supported at each corner by one who walked with sympathetic heart and gentle tread, and on the pallet the wasted form of a man. It is a helpless paralytic, on his way to Jesus, "borne of four" - Mark 2:3.

The pallet had four corners. No one person could possibly carry them all. The pastor may be Peter, and Paul, and John rolled into one, but he cannot make an ideal church by himself; every member, every church officer, every member, young and old, must co-operate to bring about the desired result. In this paralytic on his way to Jesus, "born of four", we have pictured to us the mission of the church to bring sin-sick humanity to the Great Physi-

Everyone of the four had a corner to carry. Not one of them loafed along with his hands in his pockets. Each one had a corner. So it should be in the church.

The Lord does not expect you to carry all four corners. But he does expect you to carry one. If you are a Christian, the Lord has a corner for you somewhere in his work.

First, carry your corner steadily. Suppose one of the four had let go of his corner to attend to something else. It is dangerous to fail by unsteadiness in the performance of Christian duty.

Second, carry your corner cheerfully. Do not whimper and whine over it.

Third, carry your corner in faith. They found the entrance blocked with a multitude. Had you been one of the four men, would you have given it up right there and said, "Let's carry him back home." Each man takes a fresh grip on his corner and up the stairs they press. Jesus honored them for their faith. The man was healed.

Pick up your corner today and share faithfully in the Lord's work.
